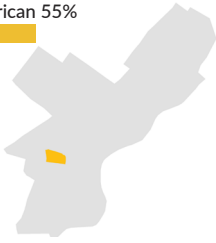

MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Thanks to WPPN partner Fab Youth Philly, multiple streets throughout the neighborhood were more engaging and active for local children than in previous summers. This past summer, 21 "play captains," youth ages 14-19, from the Promise Neighborhood were trained to lead their younger neighbors in creative play, reading, sports, and outdoor activities. For many, this was their first job and two captains said, "To know I gave a kid their best summer is something I'm really grateful for," and "If you want to come out with a great group of friends and people who can recommend you for other things, this is the job for you!" WPPN has extended the fun and learning through the school year by employing play captains to support after-school programming.
